Shoofly has a nice mix of humorous tales ("Helga, the Green Gargoyle") and more serious stories with a message, such as "Nakhio's Choice" and "Glass Horses."

Added to all this is the great music. Vol. 2 featured the Atlanta-based Bugaboos, whose fun, off-beat tunes kids are sure to enjoy.

Speaking of audio magazines, we listened to another volume (Vol. 5, Issue 9) of Boomerang!, which is aimed at school-age kids. This, too, is a sophisticated production, full of great stories, music and sounds. Most of the reporters on this news-magazine are children. It offers everything from kid-size jokes to more serious numbers.

Rachlin has an engaging voice. From her first words, she draws her audience into the stories. Her stories are full of vivid descriptions that give you a complete picture of the action and emotions involved.

Each of the stories is set to grand symphonic music performed by major orchestras—the English Chamber Orchestra, Vienna Philharmonic, Philharmonica Orchestra and Bournemouth Symphony. The works—from composers as varied as Beethoven, Vivaldi and Gershwin—complement the stories so well. This is a great way to introduce your children to classical music.

The recording features traditional folk songs sung primarily in Spanish, as well as bilingual numbers. (It can be ordered with a songbook in English.)
